INTRODUCTION

This Executive Summary presents a high-level overview of U.S. Department of Defense (DoD) contract, grant, and personnel spending during fiscal year (FY) 2023. The maps in this report provide a state-by-state summary of defense spending on six different metrics: total defense spending, total defense spending as a percentage of state gross domestic product (GDP), total contract spending, total grant spending, total personnel payroll spending, and total personnel numbers. State and local officials may use this information to assess a region's dependence on defense spending and to target assistance to support more resilient communities and companies.

Conducted between March 2024 and September 2024, the analysis primarily entailed an examination of DoD-funded prime and sub-award contract data, grant prime and sub-grant awards, and defense personnel and payroll figures. Findings are drawn from an array of sources, including the DoD's Defense Manpower Data Center and USAspending.gov, which is managed by the U.S. Department of the Treasury.

FY 2023 Overview

The DoD's budget authority increased from \$795.7 billion in FY 2022 to \$874.3 billion in FY 2023.¹ DoD contract obligations, grant obligations, and payroll spending in all 50 states and the District of Columbia totaled \$609.2 billion, approximately \$1,819 per U.S. resident and 2.2 percent of the country's GDP (see table 1). Contracts for various products and services totaled \$431.4 billion, thus comprising the majority of the spending, while DoD personnel payroll accounted for \$167.4 billion, and DoD grant spending accounted for \$10.4 billion.

Most contract funds went to supplies and equipment (such as aircraft, ships, weapons, and parts; 51 percent) and services (36 percent), with research and development (10 percent) and construction (3 percent) comprising the remainder. The largest portion of personnel pay was for active duty military (46 percent), followed by civilians (41 percent), the National Guard (8 percent), and the Reserves (5 percent). Grant awards for FY 2023 were only analyzed by state and not by service branch or award

type. DoD grant funds include funding for research and development, impact aid, National Guard programs, and Defense Production Act Title 3.

Total defense spending ranged from \$577 million in Vermont to \$71.6 billion in Texas, with a median value of

\$7.3 billion per state among the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

Approximately 59 percent of the DoD's \$609.2 billion went to 10 states (see table 1). On average, defense spending comprised 2.6 percent of a state's GDP. Several states that exceeded this average, however, were not among the top recipients of total defense spending, including Hawaii (9.2 percent of state GDP), Alaska (7.0 percent), Mississippi (6.1 percent), the District of Columbia (5.9 percent), Kentucky (5.2 percent), Alabama (4.8 percent), and Maine (4.6 percent; see table 2).

Further review shows that some states received substantial funds for contract, grant, and personnel spending, while other states received relatively high amounts in only one. Specifically, California, Maryland, Florida, Texas, and Virginia were all among the top ten recipients of defense contracts, grants, and personnel spending. In addition, New York was the only state among the top ten recipients of defense contract funds that was not among the top ten states for overall defense spending (see table 3).

Colorado, Georgia, Hawaii, and North Carolina were among the largest recipients of defense personnel spending, but were not among the top states for overall defense spending (see table 4).
